Patient Tent is Totally Restored!

Recently, on a beautiful November Sunday, the last surviving tent from the days when JCRS was known as "Tent City" was swept out and its historic furnishings were re-installed. The original iron bed, the wash stand, the chairs, the freshly laundered sheets and blankets have all been carefully rearranged. Over the course of the last year, the Foundation has repaired and restored the tent, getting almost all the materials and work donated by local businesses and volunteers. A new concrete foundation was poured by Suburban Reddi-Mix Concrete. The forms were set by Tony Capra of Arvada.





The tent was then moved to its new home by Pat McKune Professional Building Movers. Brickey Construction donated a new shingle roof and Acme Tent & Canvas provided the canvas for the interior at a discount. Mitch Waldman and Ernie Hagler volunteered their time to install the canvas. Home Depot donated lumber and other supplies for repairs. Under the direction of Lead Curator Win Ferrill from Lakewood's Heritage Center, volunteers Jack Ziegler and Russ Gleason painted (paint donated by Robert Heidt), replaced part of the wood floor, glazed the windows, replaced the door and made a new screen door. Finally, Jerry Amend from Clean as a Whistle cleaned 80+ years of grime from the windows.

Stories from the Past

This past September, we received a letter from a gentleman in Florida who discovered our project on the Internet while doing genealogical research. This excerpt of the letter he sent, (along with a generous donation), eloquently expresses our mission:

"In 1919 my grandfather, Abraham Haberman, an indigent Jewish immigrant from Poland, became one of the thousands of tuberculosis patients cared for at no charge by the Jewish Consumptives' Relief Society in Lakewood, Colorado. Like George Bailey in the film "It's a Wonderful Life", we will never know how many skilled research scientists, life-saving surgeons and everyday, productive, hard-working Americans are the progeny of patients treated at JCRS, and therefore might never have been born were it not for that benevolent institution. The Isaac Solomon Synagogue, one of the last remaining vestiges of the JCRS, stands as a vital memorial to the patients, the devoted caregivers, and the institution as a whole, and serves as an example for future generations to aspire to in caring for their fellow man.

<u>Dan Spivak</u>, grandson of Dr. Charles Spivak, passed away recently. 2007 In Review

<u>Saving a Sacred Place</u> – February - Students from the Rocky Mountain College of Art + Design presented stories and images detailing patients who were treated for tuberculosis at the JCRS in the 20th century. It was an afternoon of music, books and art sale. The sun was shining literally on a sacred place!

<u>Sunday Evening at the San</u> – July - We were honored to have Los Lantzmun donate their time and talent to perform a benefit for the foundation in the Mary Harris Auditorium. Los Lantzmun entertained the guests with their upbeat and unique style of Hebrew, Yiddish and Ladino music. The audience responded enthusiastically to the program with a standing ovation. It was reminiscent of the days when **Bob Hope**, Jerry Colonna, Judy Holliday and other luminaries performed for the patients. The "Eighth Notes" opened the evening with Hebrew songs and a song of tribute to Dr. Charles Spivak, lyrics written by Dr. Jack Sylman.

<u>Tent Dedication</u> – **December -** The last surviving tent from the JCRS days was dedicated to the **Judd Family** in recognition of **Avram Judelovitz** who located the original 20-acre tract of land in the early days of JCRS. He, along with his sons was involved in the building of the Rotunda as well as the early tents. He was a trustee of the JCRS into the l920's. It is particularly fitting to rename this tent to honor and remember the Judd family for their efforts in the 20th century as well as today, in creating a legacy to restore the synagogue.

2007 Donations


